### **Course Title**

Law Enforcement & Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) II

### **Instructor**

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### **Course Description**

The Law Enforcement & Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) II course will provide students' knowledge of the three major components: Policing, Courts, and Corrections. This course will also provide the student with a broad understanding of being a police officer, and provide students the techniques and skills to excel at the next level in their law enforcement career. Second year students will be responsible for taking on a field training role for first year students as well as meeting their academic responsibilities.

This portion of the course will meet Introductory Law Enforcement requirements for college credit. The purpose of the EMR course is to provide the knowledge and skill to meet the minimum job performance requirements of a first responder as defined by the United State Department of Transportation's (DOT) National Standard Curriculum. This program is designed for law enforcement professionals. First responder candidates must demonstrate the knowledge and skill necessary to function safely and effectively as an integral member of the patient care team.

Second year student responsibilities for success:

- Present precedent setting cases with amendments and court decisions
- Conduct weekly Law Enforcement trainings
- Conduct weekly Emergency Medical Responder trainings
- Complete Emergency Medical Responder recertification course
- Write a professional resume, and participate in two interview sessions with law enforcement and human resource professionals
- Complete a pre-employment background investigation applicant questionnaire
- Must achieve 80% or better on final cumulative Law Enforcement exam

### **Late Assignments**
